David Cassidy sets European concert dates

NEW YORK (Special)—David Cassidy, who for the past 10 months has been tantalizing his British fans with brief promotional visits and choice TV appearances, is finally setting that long-promised European concert tour for February and March, 1973.

Cassidy, whose three previous visits to England last year have caused every kind of havoc from airport riots to girls jumping into the Thames to swim to his yacht, will make England his last stop on a two-month tour Rotterdam, Stockholm and Copenhagen.

He will give a total of six concerts in England; two at Bellevue, Manchester on March 13 and 14, followed by four at the Empire Pool, Wembley, March 17 and 18.

Cassidy's TV appearances on such showcases as "Top of the Pops" seemed only dry runs for fans who needed the practice in over-running broadcasting studios, mobbing hotels, and queuing up for tickets. British press concurred with authorities at London's Heathrow Airport, and at the staid Dorchester Hotel, where Cassidy stayed during his first visit, who claimed they hadn't seen such hysteria since the Beatles.

With live appearances now in the offing, one can be sure that these past exercises in pandemonium were not wasted on Cassidy's fans.

As in the United States, Cassidy shows greatest strength with his two latest recordings, "Rock Me, Baby," and "How Can I Be Sure," from his LP, both listed on the British charts.
