

# David Cassidy's Dreams

David Cassidy, star of the TV series "The Partridge Family" and now a hot pop soloist at 23, is due to make a one-night stand in Auckland next Tuesday. Son of actor Jack Cassidy and actress, Evelyn Ward, David was lead singer on the Partridge Family single "I Think I Love You" which has sold nearly 6 million copies since its release in 1970. Local teenage fans may well find Eden Park in Auckland a bit far away for them, but they can still dream — and seek solace in his new Bell album "Dreams Are Nothin' More Than Wishes." It features his hit "Daydreamer" by Terry Dempsey as well as John Sebastian's "Daydream," given a very perky backing. Some "oldies" include Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Bali Hai," Peggy Lee's hit "Fever," and Harry Nilsson's "The Puppy Song" (found first by "The Monkees" and then by Mary Hopkin) from which the line which gave this album its title was culled. There is also "Sing Me" by Tony Romeo, which David describes as "the most personal" song ever written for him, and enhanced by a nice group of female background vocalists. "Mae" by Gary Montgomery, "Summer Days" by Tony Romeo, "Some Old Woman," "Can't Go Home Again," "Preyin' On My Mind" and "Hold On Me." The distinctive voice makes

a thoroughly professional job. Tricky cover, including notes inside by David Cassidy. Bound to be a big seller.
