Bernard Slade was quick to incorporate all these possibilities and add a good sprinkling of music and comedy as well. The music turned out to be his master-stroke.

After all, there are quite a few family shows to choose from each week in the States. But not all of these other families play up to date pop music!

Screen Gems liked the idea. They saw it could work, as the Monkees had worked a few years back. They commissioned Bernard Stade to write a pilot episode which would set out the situation, introduce all the characters and — most important of all — make folks want to see more of this family.

As you know, there were originally no plans for the actors to be real musicians. The producers reckoned that all the musical side could be taken care of by session musicians and dubbed in afterwards.

Well, how were they to know? It isn't every day that you come across actors with the talent to become chart-topping singers — even in Hollwood.

## SHIRLEY JONES

When Paul Witt and Bob Claver were casting the 'family' parts, their main concern was to find actors who looked right and had enough sense of rhythm that they could mime the music scenes convincingly.

They already had someone in mind for the central part of the mother. At this stage she was called Connie Partridge. But when Shirley Jones accepted the role, there didn't seem any reason why she shouldn't import her own name into the show with her!

For a start it was a much prettier name, and it meant that Shirley wouldn't have to start reacting to a new one all over again. "It certainly makes you feel like you belong around the place," was Shirley's comment.
