So here he was at another peak of happiness in his life. But, unfortunately, tragedy struck again at that moment. . . . In the same month that David made his first gold disc of so many, his close friend Kevin died from an splendid organisation-David and Shirley overdose of drugs.

David was shattered.

Now it had happened to two people who had had been Jimi Hendrix.

One of David's big regrets is that he never met Jimi in person. Had he lived, it's almost that we'd arrive these places and outnumber certain that they'd have gotten together some time. 'Cos David idolized Hendrix. He saw him in concert every chance he got. And it was always his dream to be just half as good on millions of TV viewers. guitar as the legendary Jimi had been.

Drugs had cheated him out of the chance of a meeting face to face. And drugs had now robbed him of a dear friend.

It took all David's professionalism to keep him on the rails as far as his work was concerned at this time.

But, as Keith Partridge, David was committed to too many people to allow himself to go under "The danger would've been if I'd had plenty of time to think and brood," he decided. "As it *************** was, I barely had time to eat, breathe and sleep in between work, which was the best possible

what stardom meant."

And that was only the start!

Brendan Cahill was the mind and organising power behind the tour, as he would be behind so many of David's later tours. Before David, he'd figured as the Monkees' recording manager, so he really knew all the ropes-plus the major hang-ups!

He did a great job, and-thanks to his managed to stay sane through what turned out to be a really hectic tour. .

"The thing I couldn't figure," David confesbeen important in his life. . . . The other person sed, "Was how there always came to be so many crowds wherever we turned up at "Before we'd set out, my secret fear had been the folks who'd come along to meet us!"

So David was really in for a big surprise. He just hadn't realised how big he was for

As it was, he arrived back home exhausted. "Filming had nothing on it!" he laughed. " don't reckon there's anything can be such a strain as being in contact with your fans, hour after hour . . . day after day. Of course, it's fantastic in lots of ways.
