actor, David does sometimes find the role of Keith a tiny bit frustrating at times. Because, you see, he wants to grow as an actor, and he can't get to do that so much when he only ever works on the one character - and, even that character isn't very demanding for an actor of David's

calibre. "David's got so many ideas in his head, so many plans he'd like to carry through. I wondered whether these

might include plans for getting married in the near future ... So I instantly checked up with Sam on this one.

Don't worry! It's O.K. His reply didn't give any sign of marriage prospects for the next few years at least:

GETTING MARRIED

"I wouldn't imagine David getting married before he was thirty at least," was Sam's "Well, anyway, I opinion . . . don't think David is ready for marriage - no matter how hooked he might seem to get on somebody.
