
DAVID CASSIDY'S Life Story

But, alas, little did David know that storm clouds loomed on the horizon-that other people in high places had other ideas about who was going to make the music for The Partridge Family series-and that if they had their way, David Cassidy would never sing or play a for-real note as "Keith Partridge" either on The Partridge Family show or on recordings!!

ENTER WES FARRELL

Later, while David sat brooding (because he had not been asked to sing on PF) in his small Hollywood Hills house, his fairy godmother was very busy in New York City preparing to take care of his future again. Larry Utall, president of Bell Records (which is Screen Gems record label), had been assigned the task of getting together a Partridge Family LP-and he, in turn, had enlisted the services of a handsome young record producer genius named Wes Farrell.

Wes, whose long list of record successes include Indian Lake by the Cowsills, Hang On Sloopy by the McCoys and Candida by Dawn (just to mention a few), prepared to fly to Los Angeles to start putting together a group of studio musicians and singers, who would record under the name of The Partridge Family. When Wes arrived in Hollywood, the first place he went was the office of *The Partridge Family* producer, Bob Claver. While Wes and Bob were going over the plans for a *Partridge Family* album, Bob said, "By the way, Wes, David's mother-she's an actress and singer named Evelyn Wardcalled me up and mentioned that David-he's the boy who's playing 'Keith Partridge' in the series—can actually sing. "Great!" Wes interrupted. "Let's get him down here and see what he sounds like."

"That's just it," Bob went on. "I called David and he's due here any moment." Bob paused for a moment and then he slowly added, "Look, even if he can't sing a note, just be nice to him and-well, we'll find somebody else to sing for him."

At that moment, Bob's secretary buzzed the intercom and announced, "David Cassidy to see you, sir." Within seconds, David, carrying a guitar and looking pretty much like a scared teenager, was shown into the room.
"I could tell right away," We's recalls, "that he was really

uptight. I mean, there he was walking in cold and he had to sit down and play and sing for us. To tell you the truth, I really felt kind of sorry for him."

David strummed the guitar and sang a few bars of a few songs. As he did so, Bob Claver's face got glummer and glummer. But Wes Farrell's expression slowly changed from detached curiosity to avid interest. All at once he leaned over and interrupted David. "Hey, man," he said, "don't do that here. That's not right-singing for us like this."

Both Bob and David stared at Wes in disbelieving silence. "What I mean is," Wes went on, "I've got to hear you in a studio. Like this—I don't know whether you can sing or not."

David stood up, looking like his whole world had caved in, but Wes continued talking. "Look, here is the address of Western Studios. I've written it down on this piece of paper for you. It's right near here-meet me there tonight at eight o'clock. O.K.?
