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his music, a sphere that constantly fascinates him. "I'm looking forward to another big change in music—where it's going to go. It changes so fast." David hopes to keep up with it, resisting the pitfall of so many musicians—repetition. "I've thought of the same melody in the middle of the night, with maybe 50 variations."

His idol in music was Jimi Hendrix, whose tragic death moved David to paste up the sticker of Hendrix's hit, JOHNNY GOT HIS GUN, beneath the photograph. It is indicative of David's own determination to stay away from drugs; the death of Hendrix was a great shock to him. "I had a lot of respect for him. Musically, he was my hero. I saw him three years ago in his first concert at the Hollywood Bowl—a fantastic performer and an incredible guitarist. After that I grabbed every opportunity to hear him sing or speak. I liked his head—Jimi was the first thing I could identify with since the Beatles, when I was 14. Jimi had a mellow head—I was behind him."

We broke the somber mood by asking him what makes him laugh, and he flashed a smile. "I like to laugh. When I'm in the mood I can laugh at anything."

He manages to laugh at himself when he cooks, an art he feels he is mastering because he now turns out instant mashed potatoes. He is careful to eat lots of salad and fresh vegetables, but hasn't yet got around to frying chicken "because I never had a chicken to fry."

We asked him about his temper and, being Irish and honest, he said that when it goes, it goes, that some mornings when he wakes up he just knows it's going to be one of those days. "But I'm really a pretty good-natured guy."

Is he moody? "I think everybody is."

We inquired about his faults and he came up with four unique drawbacks. You'd never get Cary Grant or Steve McQueen to admit the following to the press. . . .

1. I'm getting fat. I've gained six pounds.
2. I have oily hair.
3. I'm messy.
4. I'm terribly wrapped up in sleeping. I'm a great lover of the pillow."

We left the top of the hill with the definite impression that David Cassidy is an honest and sincere kid—and perhaps something of a rogue. Because as we departed, we admitted we were dated by the fact we had interviewed Shirley Jones years ago after her first starring role, in the film version of *Oklahoma!* David grinned the same amiable grin with which he'd met us at the door.

"I guess that dates her, too," he said.

From anyone else, that would have been a shaft, but not from David Cassidy. He's a good kid. □
