took drum lessons, and practiced his music regularly. He is considering taking skiing lessons in the winter and going into the next rank in Boy Scouting in the spring. All this work, and Jeremy answered his fan letters, too, so his "vacation" from the set made his days more like a very busy time than a real break from working.

Jeremy is hoping to see a white Christmas this year because he wants to go skiing with his family. That means the Gelbwaks will probably be going up north in California, and the Croughs are thinking of taking a trip to San Francisco at Christmas time. "Our family is so big, one sister in Connecticut. another one way, way up in California, and other children all in between, that it seems wisest to plan on meeting some place most convenient for the most people," says Mrs. Crough. "No matter though, where we are, it's most important that we are all together as a family." The Bonaduces want to have their family together, too, and so it is possible they will go to Philadelphia for a visit to their aunts and other relatives. There will be parties to attend, "one for the friends we haven't seen in so long, and the other one for the family itself." And the special Christmas meal for the Bonaduces is turkey with creamed chestnuts and pumpkin pie.

So the general hope from all the Partridges is to be with their families at Christmas, and the next most hopedfor thing is to have a white Christmas. To the Partridges, Christmas equals family equals Christmas, no matter where they are!
