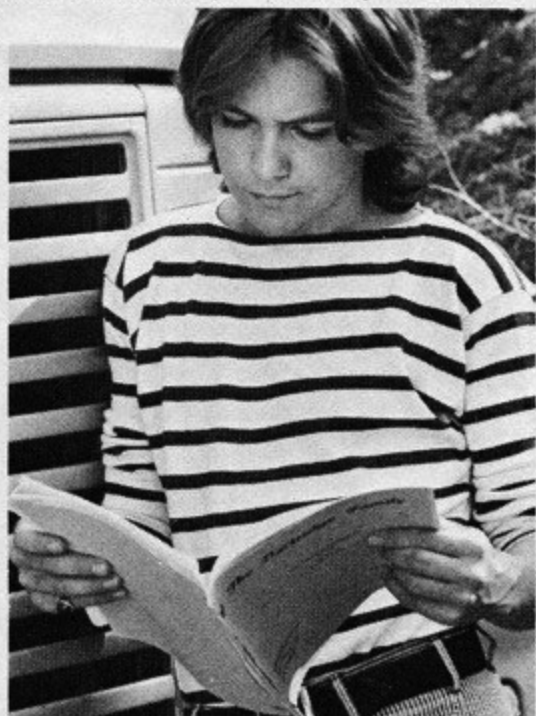


At home, David stretches out on his bed while he talks to a friend on the phone. On very nice days, he goes out onto his sunny porch to study his script. It's really comfortable.
