injection which put him to sleep in preparation for the ordeal.

He was wheeled into the operating room. During the two and a half hours he was there, Jack, Shirley, and Evelyn waited impatiently in his room, pacing back and forth. Though doctors had assured them David would be fine, only a mother and a father can know what it feels like at a time like this, when they see their little boy suffering-and they are helpless to relieve it!

"Shirley and Jack kept saying, 'Why couldn't it be me instead?" according to a close family friend. "They were upset. But they had to trust the doctors.

After the surgery, David's condition was listed as "fair." When he'd entered Mt. Sinai, it was "poor," so at least there was an improvement. David lay unconscious in the recovery room for five hours. Shirley and Jack were not allowed to see him.

Shirley wanted to go in and hold his hand. Even if he were oblivious to her presence, she felt he'd know she was close, but hospital rules wouldn't permit it. They could only wait; it seemed they'd been waiting for years.

As of this writing, David is still hospitalized but is expected to return home shortly. He feels better but he is still a very sick young man, and only time will tell how successful the operation will be.

He was close to death; he knows what it feels like to fear death. He knows what it feels like to have a "demon" in your body, one that robs you of your health and strength.

They found this demon in time, hopefully, to destroy it. David Cassidy seems to have won his battle to live. He cheated death.

But he was scared. In spite of all the doctor's reassurances he did not think he would make it. His greatest fear, he said, was that after they gave him a shot to "put him to sleep," he might never wake up again.

But prayer and belief got him through. And, as you're reading this, David is still at home resting and recovering his strength. He wants to go back to work but only time will tell just how normal a life he will be able to lead.

toward her daughter and kept her awake at night, deep in thought.

As a result Jackie, much as she must have wanted to keep Caroline with her for the entire summer, had to change her plans. She had to send the daughter she loved away—there was no other choice!

What was it that startled Jackie? Some might suspect it was an isolated incident, but they're wrong. It was an insight that made Jackie proud and frightened, joyous and sad. She saw, for the first time, that her daughter had stopped being a little girl and had become a young woman, at a very painful, awkward stage.

"It's happened so fast it seems," says a friend of Jackie's mother, Mrs. Marjorie Auchincloss. "I guess all of us have thought of Caroline as a girl-an active and charming girl. Now, it's different. She's becoming a woman, and Bouvier girls often have to be on their own to make the transition.'

Like the Kennedy girls who are her aunts, the young Caroline Kennedy was more interested in horses and sports than in fashion. This past spring, some distinctly Bouvier trends became apparent when Caroline started making regular shopping trips, often following her mother's "if you can't decide which color to choose, choose both!" philosophy.

When Caroline arrived in Greece this summer, she brought along a wardrobe of long and short skirts, hot pants, slinky jerseys, and even some sexy bathing suits—all of which she picked out herself!
"I think," says the family friend, "that
