

THIS IS THE BOTTOM HALF OF YOUR DOUBLE DECKER PARTRIDGE POSTER! Just follow the directions below to remove and assemble the whole poster!

Directions: Turn to centerfold and carefully open staples. Lift out centerfold and the double pages under it. Then you can lift out pages 28 and 41 together—the bottom half of your Double Decker Partridge Poster! Then overlap the top half of the poster onto the bottom half so that the two parts of the picture join exactly, and tape together. Then you will have Danny sitting on David's shoulders, just as you see in the sample picture below!
