She has become thinner, and more elegant, and her beautiful, delicate face shone not only with girlish charm, but also with warm motherliness. At her neck a small, expensive porcelain watch dangeld on a silver chain. She lit a cigarette. "A drink, Elizabeth?" asked Burton. He always calls her Elizabeth, her full name, not Liz or darling.

I am of the other opinion, I find it better to be left in peace and quiet. That is just why I love this splendid place so much. The Burtons gave us two hours of their valuable time. That night they had to pack to leave as Elizabeth was making Night Watch in London. Burton has recently completed two films: Tito and Trotsky, "It is completely by chance," he said, "that I am playing two Communists at the same time."

One day S&C found out they couldn't buy a hit record. That's when they had to revamp their whole act. Sonny felt perhaps they could make it in movies so he sank their bankroll into a couple, and lost it.

They went into night clubs, added a lot of comedy to their act and Cher began singing "straight" songs, i.e., popular standards She has a lovely, sexily husky voice.

They found a new audience, older, more sophisticated. Yet, with their modern look and rock style, they kept many of their young fans.

That's what David would like to do now He loves his young fans and appreciates all they've done for him, but it's time to grow as a performer. Keith Partridge is a pretty set character and there can be no reason to change him, unless the ratings begin to slip

As has been pointed out time and time again, teen idols last only three or four years. Then they fade away. It happened to Sonny and Cher. David has no reason to believe that he will escape this fate.

If he is as lucky as Sonny and Cher, he will find new popularity. He hopes to get into serious acting as well as continue with his recording career. But the longer he continues as Keith Partridge, the more "typed" he will get and the harder good acting jobs will be to come by. So, perhaps his public battle with Sonny and Cher will. in the long run, help him—if he loses!

For, you see, this year CBS television decided to go after the young audience that the ABC network has captured with their Friday night lineup of The Brady Bunch and The Partridge Family. CBS took their most popular comedy-variety hour, Sonny and Cher Bono, and pitted them head on against the ABC shows—in a fight to the finish.

Years ago, NBC tried this with the Sunday night at eight spot which belonged to Ed Sullivan's Toast of the Town.
