Also, taking creative writing courses in junior & senior high schools are really helpful. Then a college degree (with emphasis on magazine writing) is always helpful in getting that very important first interview!

My advice to the readers who are interested in magazine work is to take lots of English and journalism courses in college and high school. Join the school newspaper, work on your school annual, become a member of any writing clubs around.

Get in touch with the publications

you want to work for before graduation so that they'll know who you are and what you can do. Of course, make yourself known without being bothersome or pesty—there's a way of getting attention without being a nuisance!

I began working in the magazine field as the secretary to the publisher of a magazine in New York City. Then I gradually got more involved in the editorial end and became the assistant editor, then I moved up to production manager. I really appreciated getting the chance to learn as many aspects of the magazine business as possible.
