

## SINGLES OF THE MONTH:

David Cassidy: DAYDREAM. David's new single! It's a remake of an oldie by the Lovin' Spoonful, and the arrangement is just great (no need saying David's great—you knew that already!). We also like the other side, "Can't Go Home Again," written by David, and friends Kim Carnes and Dave Ellingson.

The New Seekers: THE GREATEST SONG I'VE EVER HEARD. If you liked the song on "The Helen Reddy Show" this summer, you'll love it on your record player!
