Five years ago, he was getting \$38.80 a week net in the mailroom of a textile company to earn money in New York while he studied acting. By late 1972 he was looking for land in Hawaii for a farm. The substantial salary he earns from The Partridge Family covers most of his living expenses. Most of the money he makes comes from concert tours. Next come the record sales, then the TV

show, and the music writing on the records. He also has his own publishing company, probably the US Treasury does

"The thing I've gained from our friendship is seeing David's drive and determination and confidence that got him where he is. It's phenomenal and I envy him for it. He had an emotional setback when he broke up from this girl. When we have one, we can crawl away for a month or however long it takes to get on the ground again, but when you're in the public eye, you've got to keep going, keep smiling. He has got himself together now and he has more drive and is more positive than he was when all this started happening."

All David's money is carefully invested so that he could live off it now if necessary. "He doesn't have to do it for money any more," Sam said. "He's doing it because he wants to. David once said to me: 'I've got the cake. Now it's all icing.'

"I can remember about five years ago when David living with his mother. He's had practically no formal musical training. Every time I came over, he was playing his guitar. I'd say: 'Give me a break. Practise when I'm not here,' and he'd say: 'Wait. Some day people will say I'm good.'
