The big ones are Keith (David Cassidy) and Laurie (Susan Dey). For script purposes, Cassidy, 21, and Miss Dey, 18, will "stay in high school forever, like Little Orphan Annie."

Shirley balks at "the usual mother image of male television writers, the little woman in the kitchen stirring something on the stove and patting the little dear on the head. "I refuse to allow my own children to wallow in self-pity, so won't allow it of my television children. I won't say, 'No, Danny, honey, let mother help you. What's your little problem?'
