One studio press agent whispered in my ear one night, "Call me tomorrow and let me know if Universal's party was better than ours "

The movie companies seem to have the feeling that their potential strength is better assessed in the glow of liquor, bright lights and excessive pomp. These parties are right out of the 1930 movies, except that much of the dance music is contemporary.

Universal hosted a pair of parties, one each for its show on NBC and ABC. So did Warner Brothers. Screen Gems took over the Columbia Ranch (the back lot set, also situated in Burbank), served hot dogs (from a New York-style mobile stand) and charcoal-broiled steaks, while David Cassidy mingled with the crowd and complained about the story, but not the picture (a nudie), that Rolling Stone ran on him re-

Cassidy said Rolling Stone assigned a reporter to him for a weekend when he agreed to the interview, but that the first story written for the weekly was so puffy and flattering it embarrassed him. He said Rolling Stone showed him a copy of it before it was scheduled to run and it read more like his own press agent would send to a fan magazine.
