And on top of all that, David was so far removed from his audience that he appeared to be the star puppet, and as such was unable to project his charisma across the arena with the desired effect.

Don't get the wrong idea about his fans, though. David's mere presence was enough to provide delicious excitement from the young teenagers, even though a subtle vacuum was left by the poor view, the poor sound and the way the show seemed to be competing for time.
