One of the hottest properties in show business is a fellow named David Cassidy. A recent performance in Madison Square Garden had the young audience in an ecstatic furor.

What kind of electricity does this young man generate?

WELL, THE kid's got class. Look at the first letter of his name. Excellent taste, originality and a bit of culture all wrapped up in one letter.

A combination of this type is rare and it lifts the curtain on why young Cassidy is gaining an unusual charisma.

The rest of the actor's first name reflects the same good taste, with the ending "d" oddly pointing to something in the past.

CASSIDY'S surname is much more conventional. Not quite childishly written, it points out that the star identifies himself more strongly with his first name rather than that of his famous father, Jack Cassidy.

The readable script discloses the singer clearly wants to communicate. From his screaming adolescent audiences he's doing a good job of it.
