The conditions are ripe for an outbreak of bad feeling between the generations. "It's the 'Bad Seed' story all

over again," predicts a broadcasting authority. "Don't be surprised if the kids don't begin wiping out their parents over this issue."

No broadcasting authority was willing to be quoted on the number of killings expected to take place in the event of the program shuffling. But one would be too many. The very fabric of American society will be rent by the ABC "ripoff" artists.
