But try as he might on this visit he has, as usual been hounded by a clutch of female admirers. It means little of his personal life seems to have charged.

As he talked at the offices of RCA Records this week, a body-guard sat in the corner with the kind of impassive expression peculiar to men of his calling.

And a few yards away a film crew hovered waiting for their pre-arranged ten minutes with the star.

"David is very sensitive to close ups. If you get within ten feet he'll kick you out."

Cassidy himself has, however, always been one of the more interesting and erratic of teenage phenomena. Over the last two years he has announced he was going to retire several times over. Also he has appeared more human and failible than the usual clean-limbed prototype. He was never the right man for the part from the beginning.

Fed up

It does therefore not seem too out of character for Cassidy to announce that he is fed up with being the staple diet of teen dreams. He says he never wanted it in the first place and for that reason became disorientated by his success.

"When I was a young unknown actor on the Partridge Family I signed my name away. There was little I could do about it.

"I was turned into something I wasn't.

Eventually I was like an embtional yo-yo. I was high one day and into incredible lows the next.

My girl friend left me because I couldn't give her enough time but I didn't have enough time for myself. I couldn't cope with making records: the business hassles, success and trying to keep a relationship going.

It was then that I decided to drop out of it all. I became a vegetable for a while. I had two collapses and became a recluse.

"Now for the first time I don't feel like I'm acting at what I'm doing."

As yet though it has had little impact on his fans. Cassidy may be weary of girls screaming at him but there is little he can do to avoid it.
