Cassidy's big comeback begins in Britain

THE THINKING thirteen year old's pin up David Cassidy has emerged from his self-induced retirement to relaunch his singing career.

Cassidy's boyish good looks and sentimental songs provided the only real threat to the sugary sweetness of Donny Osmond in the battle to win the hearts of teenage girls all over the world in the mid-seventies.

But the man whose face filled thousands of bedroom walls abandoned his singing career at the height of his fame ten years ago when the pressure of being adored by hordes of teenage girls became too much for him.

By 1975 the pressure of working 18 hour days trying to balance his career as a successful singer of hits like "Could It Be Forever" and "How Can I Be Sure" and his equally popular role as Keith

Partridge in the hit TV series "The Partridge Family" had taken its toll.

His stage comeback came through a succession of acting roles in the theatre including the lead in the Broadway production of "Joseph And The Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" and appearances in highly acclaimed American TV series.

Now Cassidy is back in Britain preparing his first album for over eight years which is due for release within the next few months.

The first single "The Last Kiss" is released complete with a glossy picture to prove that although he may be a little weathered he is still pin-up material.

And there's obviously still some of the old magic – when he left the recent BPI awards ceremony he could still raise a few cheers from the crowd who'd gathered to greet today's batch of teen idols.
