avid Cassidy wowed teenage girls in the '70s in The Partridge Family, as perhaps the world's most perfect teen idol. Later came work in Las Vegas (he starred opposite Sheena Easton in At the Copa) and Broadway (working with Petula Clark in Blood Brothers).

Q: Which members of The Partridge Family are you still in touch with? (Jennifer Scott, Phoenix)


