Statement. She's really got to know David Cassidy through co-starring with him on television, and if it's just not true that they've ever had any big romantic scene going, then it's surely true that she has been as close to David as most girls.

and even "prefers the company of his dogs to girls."

Take your choice. But certain facts do emerge, and these are facts straight from David himself. First, he just doesn't have the time these days to have girls around him wherever he goes. He has a work schedule that would scare the pants off most people, and more often than not he just topples into bed at home, arming himself first with some milk and crackers, and he's dead to the world within a matter of moments. He sure doesn't help the late-night movie ratings!

But girls play a very important part in his life, because they buy his records by the million and he's got intense feelings of loyalty towards them. 
So the girl of his dreams would have to be understanding about his love of the open-air life . . . otherwise her own dream could turn into a nightmare.
